# **SAT/ACT:** SAT or ACT plus Writing test scores are required for admission to college. Some colleges **require** the SAT/ACT scores to be sent directly from the testing agency. Check your school to see what the specific requirements are for admission.

**Prepare for the SAT/ACT.** Use your PSAT results, purchase a book of practice tests and strategies, or take a prep course. These scores are very important in college admission.

**ASVAB:** Students interested in the Military should also take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery. Check with your counselor about testing dates.

**PSSA:** The Pennsylvania State Assessment tests are given to juniors in writing, reading, and math. Students must achieve at the "proficient" level in all three areas to avoid retesting.
